## Christmas Family Tree

- The genealogy of Jesus through Joseph in the book of Matthew gives Jesus the legal right to the throne of David.
- The genealogy of Jesus through Mary in the book of Luke gives Jesus the biological right to the throne of David.
  - Matthew traces the genealogy of Jesus to Abraham to identify Him with the Jewish people.
  - Luke traces the genealogy of Jesus to Adam to identify Him with all people.
  - Matthew connects Jesus to the promises God made to Abraham and David. Genesis 12:1-3; 2 Samuel 7:12-13
    - Abraham -- Jesus is the one through whom all the families of the earth will be blessed.
    - David -- Jesus is the king who will rule and reign forever and ever.
  - Luke connects Jesus to the promises God made to Adam. Genesis 3:15
    - Jesus is the seed of the woman who will crush the head of the serpent.
- > The genealogies of Jesus teach us about the **character of God**.
  - He graciously works to **save people** from their sin.
  - He always **keeps** the promises he makes.
  - He chooses and uses people by grace.
- > The genealogies of Jesus point us to **the story of two Adams**.
  - Genesis 5:1 This is the **book of generations** when **God created man.**
  - Matthew 1:1 This is the book of generations when God became man.
  - The first Adam was created from **dust** and the **breath of God**.
  - The last Adam came from **the seed of a woman** and the **Spirit of God.**
  - With the first Adam, God made man in His image and likeness.
  - With the last Adam, God took on the image and likeness of man.
  - The first Adam became a living person -- Genesis 2:7
  - The last Adam became a life-giving person -- 1 Corinthians 15:45

- The first Adam **failed to obey God** and as a result all His offspring **die**. Genesis 5
- The last Adam **always obeyed God** and as a result all His offspring **live.** Philippians 2:8; John 3:16

- 6. From the sermon outline, what stands out to you about the story of two Adams? What does this teach us about the unity of the Bible? What does this teach us about the big message of the Bible?
